

Director's Note

"After all, the world has changed a great deal in our lifetime... lot's of things that mattered dreadfully when we were young, don't matter at all any more." Felicity, Countess of Marshwood (Act 1 Scene 2)

Relative Values reflects a world on the brink of enormous social change. Class systems based on inherited title and land were giving way to a hierarchy, which relied increasingly on wealth and fame. Noel Coward, the master of razor sharp wit, captures in this play not simply the perceived pomposity of the English aristocracy of the time, nor the gaudy spectacle of the Hollywood star, system but the confusion caused by a world of changing values.

"I tried to reason with her.... to point out the changing values of this changing world." Crestwell (Act 1 Scene 1)

When this world is brought into the country estate of Marshwood, it is the Countess's personal maid and friend, Moxie, who will suffer most. The household is thrown into confusion in an effort to protect her feelings while Moxie herself is torn between doing what she believes to be right or keeping her pride and her position.

"I am not going to be parted from Moxie. I couldn't live without her and I don't intend to try." Felicity, Countess of Marshwood (Act 1 Scene 2)

While the world cannot return to what it once was in the end it is the values of friendship and loyalty that remain untarnished. I know you will enjoy your evening the Mr Coward and his friends.
