

**Director's Note** 

Noel Coward's classic comedy poses the question – how do you get rid of an ex when they are determined to stay around?

When Charles arranges a séance to be held at his home in order to gather information for his latest novel, he has no idea of the possible consequences.

At first Charles is appalled to discover that the spirit of his first wife, Elivra, seems to have manifested permanently in the house he now shares with his second wife, Ruth.

However, despite initial reservations, and Ruth's horror, Charles begins to enjoy his reunion with Elvira.

Why has Elvira really returned? Is Ruth right to suspect ulterior motives? And is Madame Arcati all she appears to be?
